Institution has well planned system for the delivery of curriculum, accordingly, IQAC in consultation with the Principal take following measures:-

1. Principal in consultation with IQAC design academic calendar at the end of previous session in coherence with academic calendar of affiliated university.
2. While preparing academic calendar for effective delivery of the curriculum views expressed by stakeholders taken into consideration.
3. All the departments follow academic calendar which includes lecture hours, topics to be taught and other co-curricular activities.
4. While framing time table, committee strictly follows directions from Government of Maharashtra and Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.
5. The head of the departments conducts academic planning meeting with faculty, to plan and organize the schedule of lectures and distributes the syllabus among them. If, for any reason, a faculty fails to finish syllabus within the stipulated time, they arrange extra classes.
6. Institution provides academic diary to the faculty members in which they note down their daily periods and practical work done.
7. Institution implements internal evaluation system (Unit Test, seminar, project work, assignment, study tour and practical examinations as well as pre-semester examination for each semester) and all the records are maintained.
8. Staff meetings are conducted frequently by Principal, which include the discussion regarding organization of guest lecturers, special day celebration and cultural activities.
9. For an effective implementation of curriculum, teachers adopted teaching methods such as presentation, assignments, experimentation and seminars.
10. To make teaching-learning effective, faculties blend traditional method of 'chalk and talk' with ICT enabled PPT and audio-visual teaching aids.
11. Faculty devise innovative teaching-learning methods, such as, 'Participative Learning'. IQAC maintain the role of facilitator for effective delivery of curriculum by periodically discussing various aspects of teaching and learning with faculties. If there is any difficulty expressed by faculty in curriculum delivery, taken in good spirit, in such cases IQAC discusses it with the Principal of the institution and try to sort it out.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The institution has since 2014/2015 practiced a system of mentoring through Student Guardian Scheme. In student guardian scheme every faculty is provided with the list of certain number of students admitted in Sem I. He has responsibility to look after his/her academic, socioeconomic and psychological well being and also monitor class attendance and performance, throughout his/her graduation and also look after his progression in future. Under the Student Guardian Scheme, the full time teachers of the college have been engaged as mentors of particular group of class. Students of each class in the college are having a full time teacher as their mentor. At the beginning of the academic session, the class wise names of the mentors are displayed on the college website. Mentor starts their duties by frequent meetings with their parents and assess socioeconomic background of each and every student through prescribed format. The mentors are responsible for academic progress and psychological well being of their mentee. They are also entrusted with the task of monitoring the attendance and academic progress of the students. They also provide primary psychological counseling to those who need them and refer them for more professional counseling, if required. At the beginning of the academic session, the mentors conduct personal meetings with mentee, whereby they are acquainted with the institution,

its goals and mission, the facilities available and the regulations of the affiliating university. The mentors maintain the biographic details of each individual mentee including educational background and socioeconomic status. They also maintain record of their class attendance, class performance and academic progress. The mentors use both formal and informal means of mentoring. The mentor system, apart from its formal part, also play the role 'Motivator' to boost inclusiveness, gender sensitivity and social responsibility of students.

While preparing academic calendar, directions regarding workload and working hours of teaching faculty strictly follows. Academic calendar also placed in the College Development Committee, resolution to this effect passed in the meeting. In academic calendar, programmes of N.S.S. were given due weightage. 2. Women Empowerment and Gender Sensitization Goal Most of the girls are coming from surrounding villages with little or no educational background. These girls belong to tribal and poor strata of the society, having poor health hygiene facilities to their disposal. As a result of this, some of them enrolled in higher education programmes but their lower attendance in college and minimal active participation in academics, cultural activities and sport was always a big challenge to tackle. Hence, it is our goal to sensitize the girls about importance of higher education and empower them to participate actively in all the college activities. The Context There is an alarming rise in violence against women. The society cannot be developed if half its populace is deprived of a dignified existence. As citizens of India it is our primary duty to uphold the values of equality, liberty, justice and fraternity enshrined in our constitution. For this, the college formed ICCPUSH cell. This cell prepared their annual plan which has its focus on girl students, their empowerment, and their curricular, cocurricular, extracurricular development. The Practice On dated January, 3,2019, College celebrate Womans Liberation Day (Mahila Mukti Din), birth aniversary of great social reformer and first woman teacher, Savitribai Phule to sensitize students toward the value of gender equity. In order to sensitize students, staff and society, the college organized sensitization One Day Workshop by ICCPUSH on dated January, 25, 2019. In this workshop, Dr. Sharvari Rudey (MBBS), Nagpur, guided girls students through Powerpoint Presentation in very lucid language. She has stressed upon the personal hygiene measures to be adopted during menstruation and as a daily practice. Evidence of Success Demography of Nagbhid taluka indicates that, approximately 50 population belongs to tribal community. In the social structure of tribal community, womans are subjected to gender bais that resulted in lower percentage of girls enrollment in higher education. But after organization of such sensitization programmes, enrollment in higher education and their active participation increased enormously. Women found herself empowered economically and socially after organization of such programmes. Problems Encountered and Resources Required As most of the students are from the rural and tribal region and parents are illeterate, they are not motivated towards higher education. We solved this problem by counselling of parents regarding importance of higher education for better lifestyle. During organization of these programmes problem of insufficient funds occurred, but our management provide funds.
